I-S Students at EAA 2017

I-S students again were a big part of the KidVenture experience this summer at the EAA convention.

The convention began promptly at 9 a.m. (our kids started at 7 a.m.) on Monday, July 24 and ended on Sunday, July 30.

Somewhere around 30,000 people visit the KidVenture Campus during the week, most were children.

There are many aviation related activities aimed directly at those children, but the accompanying parents also seemed to be inter-

ested and entertained as well.

At our EAA Pioneer airport Whitman hangar location, one of three different hangar locations, visiting children could take a simulated flight in a Mercury space capsule.

They could build a balsa jet glider, or choose and build one of nine different static models like the B-17, Black Hawk Helicopter, Pitts Special biplane, Christian Eagle Biplane, P-51, P-47, P-64, Piper Cub, or Boeing 787.

Kids could witness large R/C aircraft being constructed. They could also train on one of 15 different R/C flight simulator sta-

tions, and proceed outside to the flight line to actually fly an R/C airplane.

Visitors to a previous EAA event were surveyed after the week, and the only area that scored better than KidVenture was the magnificent EAA Museum itself.

Over the past 15 years student volunteers from Iola-Scandinavia have played a big role in making the KidVenture campus so popular and successful.

On Sunday afternoon, as the show closed, a member of the EAA board of directors made it a point to stop by and to make sure I

Dear Parents/Guardians:

Welcome to a new school year! The Iola-Scandinavia School Nutrition Staff is looking forward to serving your children nutritious, great-tasting menus that support their achievements in school and promote healthy lifestyles.

Each school kitchen has a team of highly trained staff (often times parents of school district students themselves), who receive and safely prepare food, cashier, serve meals and keep the kitchen clean.

They work together, often incorporating ideas gathered from students and parents.

Our menus are designed to ensure that students receive a balanced meal, consisting of foods from all major food groups in the right proportions to meet calorie and other nutrient needs.

The products and the cooking methods we use conserve food quality and nutrients, while limiting the addition of fats and eliminating frying.

So although you may see popular items like pizza and chicken nuggets on your menus, be assured that your child's school meal selections contain healthy whole grains and are lower in fat and salt than what you find in grocery stores or restaurants. We will also be offering some different foods that your children may not have tried before, so please encourage your child to taste these items. They just might become a new favorite!

We are sensitive to the various nutritional needs of our students. If your child has a food allergy or food sensitivity, please contact me or our school nurse.

Our lunch and breakfast programs continue to be a great value and a huge convenience for busy families too! Lunch costs \$2.60 daily for students 4K-6 and \$2.90 daily for students 7-12.

Breakfast will be offered at the elementary school at

a cost of \$1.55 daily. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced

price meals. Reduced price for lunch is \$.40 per day for students 4K-12.

Breakfast will be offered free to those students who qualify for reduced price meals (4K-6 only). Elementary students who qualify for free hot lunch are also eligible to receive free breakfast.

Your children may qualify for free or reduced price meals. Free and reduced price meal applications are mailed to households at the start of each school year, are available in each school office, on the school website in the School Nutrition link, and upon request anytime during the school year.

Additional food items, such as extra entrées and ala carte beverages, will be available to purchase during middle and high school lunch. The family foodservice account must have a positive account balance in order to purchase ala carte items.

Our menus are published monthly in the Orange & Black, on our school website, and copies are available in each school office.

Work Permits

Prior to beginning employment, students under the age of 18 must obtain a Work Permit according to state law.

The following items are required before a Work Permit can be issued:

- Proof of age (birth certificate, Wisconsin driver's license, baptismal certificate, or Wisconsin ID card).
- Employer's written consent to hire, including company name, address and phone; job duties to be performed; and the hours and time of day to be worked.

- Parent/guardian written consent.
- Social Security card.
- Payment of \$10 permit fee.

Work permits can be obtained from Lauren Borth at the High School, or Micki Bonikowske at the District Office, located in the Elementary School.

It is that time of year again when we need to make the transition from a summer schedule to school mode.

I'm excited to be starting my third year in the Iola-Scandinavia district and want to take a moment to remind students and parents/guardians about the services offered through the middle/high school counseling office.

I work with students regarding academic concerns, post-secondary planning, and personal/social issues or concerns.

We also have a job board in our office, issue work permits, and have many resources on our school counseling website, which is a great resource for scholarship information, testing resources, as well as college and military visit dates.

With the new school year about to begin there are a few things students and their families should keep on their radar:

- Students have until Sept. 8 to request changes to their schedule, but no changes will be enacted during the first two days of school.
- Any student in need of school supplies can pick up materials in the high school/middle school office.
- Any senior who plans to retake the ACT should make arrangements to do so by going to <http://www.actstudent.org>. If you have any questions about this process, please contact the counseling office.
- Any senior needing to take the Accuplacer should contact the technical college they are applying to in order to make arrangements.
- Colleges and universities are currently accepting applications. We recommend applying early. There will be an application TREK early in the semester for seniors who are interested.

- Every year, the counseling office hosts a presentation about financial aid and paying for college. Additional information about this November event will be sent out early in the school year. FAFSA applications can be submitted starting Oct. 1.
- All juniors and their parent(s)/guardian(s) are invited to schedule an Academic & Career Planning (ACP) conference first semester. This is a great opportunity for us to communicate and work as a team to help your student achieve success with attaining educational and career goals after high school. A letter with more information will be sent home with students during the first quarter.

The only difficulty I had all week was keeping a full crew of I-S kids in our Whitman Hangar location. Chairmen from other KidVenture

locations kept borrowing from my I-S team to assist with their location/programs.

Planning for KidVenture 2018 has already begun, and it is a sure thing that next years activities will be even more varied and enhanced. Late word is that this year set an attendance record.

Here are some of the numbers for this year:

- 37 I-S High School Student Volunteers (appx. 16 percent of the student body)
- 1 wife Volunteer
- 4 adult driver volunteers
- 98 full day shifts doing glider/model assembly, flight simulator monitoring, aviation motor mechanics instruction, and registration for the FAA/EAA “hands-on” education program.
- 16 round trips to Oshkosh

- 6 crew stops (morning coffee, et.al.) at Sunset Corner BP

High school students enrolled in technology education, art, and/or foods classes will have additional fees.

Parents/guardians wishing to take care of these obligations prior to the start of the school on Aug. 28 may do so at the High School office.

Students who have not met their obligations by Sept. 8 may lose privileges.

If you have concerns about paying these fees please feel free to contact me.

Wisconsin Statute 118.15 specifies that it is the responsibility of the parent or guardian to see that their child attends school regularly during the full period and hours that their school is in session.

Please try to schedule appointments and vacations for a time when school is not in session.

If your child is unable to attend school please call by 8:15 a.m. the same day and explain why the student is absent.

You can call anytime and leave a message on the 24-hour voice mail. Please be sure to include the reason as to why your child will be absent.

A student may be excused from school attendance in advance if his/her parent/guardian submits a pre-arranged absence form to the school attendance officer at least one day prior to the student’s absence.

A student may be excused under this provision for not more than 10 days in the school year.

The student is responsible for completing the pre-arranged absence form, taking it home for a parent/guardian signature, and submitting it to the office 24 hours prior to the planned absence.

The school does not accept notes or phone calls for pre-arranged absences; the form must be completed and submitted.

The student is also responsible for any course work missed during this absence. A prearranged absence form is necessary for any athlete who is absent the day of or the day after a competition.

If you son/daughter needs to take any

form of medication during the school day or while engaged in school sponsored activities please contact Wendy Williams in the Middle/High School office.

State law requires that we keep all medications in the office and that forms and permissions are correctly on file.

The school cannot maintain or dispense any type of medication, even over the counter medications, without the proper paperwork on file. Medications must be presented in the original container and a form must be completed by a parent/guardian prior to administration by school personnel.

Prescription medications may only be administered with a physician’s written consent.

Students who use an inhaler must have a signed consent form from a physician authorizing the student to carry and administer their medication.

At no time should students have over-the-counter or prescription medications on their person, in purses, backpacks or bags, or in their locker while at school or participating in school events.

Please drive with great care when dropping off and picking up students.

Please follow the posted speed limit and the directional arrows for entering and leaving the lot.

Parents picking up their children at the end of the school day are asked to enter and exit using the driveway on the west side of the lot.

Vehicles may not leave the lot using the Jackson Street exit while the buses are in the lot.

Each student will receive a copy of our Student Handbook/Agenda on the first day of school. This book contains additional information about the operation of our school and expectations of the students.

We ask that each student and parent take a few minutes to read through the information contained in the handbook.

The plan was initially developed in 2012 and is reviewed as necessary.

The plan was developed as deemed appropriate for the district.

This annual publication is part of the Iola-Scandinavia School District's communication plan within the IEQ management plan.

Meningococcal Disease:

Protect Your Child Prevent Fatal Infection with Vaccine

Public health authorities recommend that teenagers and college-bound students be immunized against a potentially fatal bacterial infection called Meningococcal Disease, a type of meningitis.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and other leading medical organizations recommend routine meningococcal immunization for adolescents at high school entry (15-year-olds) if they have not previously been immunized, and for college freshmen living in dormitories.

Meningococcal Disease is a rare but potentially fatal bacterial infection that can cause severe swelling of the brain and spinal cord (meningitis) or a serious blood infection (meningococemia).

Meningococcal Disease strikes up to 3,000 Americans each year; nearly 30 percent of these cases are among teenagers and college students.

A meningococcal vaccine is available for use among persons aged 11 to 55 years, which provides protection against four of the five types of bacteria that may cause Meningococcal Disease.

Many parents are unaware of the dangers the disease poses to their children and that a vaccine is available that may help to prevent up to 83 percent of cases among teens and college students.

Immunization is the most effective way to prevent this very serious disease.

Often Misdiagnosed

Meningococcal Disease is often misdiagnosed as something less serious because early symptoms are similar to common viral illnesses.

Symptoms of Meningococcal Disease may include high

fever, severe headache, stiff neck, nausea, vomiting, sensitivity to light, confusion, exhaustion and/or a rash.

Meningococcal Disease is spread through direct contact with respiratory and/or oral secretions from infected persons (for example, kissing or sharing drinking containers).

It can develop and spread quickly throughout the body, so early diagnosis and treatment are very important.

Even with immediate attention, the disease can kill an otherwise healthy young person within hours of first symptoms.

Approximately 10 percent to 14 percent of people that contract the disease die from it. Of those who survive, up to 20 percent may endure permanent disabilities, including brain damage, deafness and limb amputations.

Lifestyle factors common among teenagers and college students are believed to put them at increased risk of contracting Meningococcal Disease. These lifestyle factors include crowded living situations (for example, dormitories, sleep-away camps), active or passive smoking and irregular sleeping habits.

Teens should avoid sharing eating utensils and drinking out of the same container since infections may spread through this type of close contact.

2017-18 School Year Asbestos Notification

As a result of federal legislation, Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA), each primary and secondary school in the nation is required to complete a stringent inspection for asbestos and to develop a plan of management for all asbestos-containing building materials.

The Iola-Scandinavia School District has a goal to be in full compliance with this law and is following the spirit as well as the letter of the law.

As a matter of policy, the district shall continue to maintain a safe and healthful environment for our community's youth and employees.

In keeping with this legislation, all buildings (including portables and support buildings) owned or leased by the Iola-Scandinavia School District were inspected by Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) accredited inspectors and samples were analyzed by an independent laboratory.

Based on the inspection, the school prepared and the

state approved a comprehensive management plan for handling the asbestos located within its buildings safely and responsibly.

Furthermore, the Iola-Scandinavia School District has completed the 3-Year Re-Inspections required by AHERA. Our district buildings where asbestos-containing materials were found are under repair, removal, and Operations and Maintenance.

This past year, the Iola-Scandinavia School District conducted the following with respect to its asbestos containing building materials: Continued our Operations and Maintenance Program.

Federal law requires a periodic walk-through (surveillance) every six months of each area containing asbestos. In addition, the law requires all buildings to be re-inspected three years after a management plan is in effect. MacNeil Environments, Inc. will accomplish this under

contract.

Short-term workers (outside contractors, i.e., telephone repair workers, electricians and exterminators) must be provided information regarding the location of asbestos in which they may come into contact. All short-term workers shall contact the lead maintenance person to be given this information before commencing work.

The Iola-Scandinavia School District has a list of the location(s), type(s) of asbestos-containing materials found in its school buildings and a description and timetable for their proper management.

A copy of the Asbestos Management Plan is available for review in the District Office. Copies are available at 25-cents per page.

Nondiscrimination Policy

The Iola-Scandinavia School District is committed to providing equal educational opportunities for all students in the district.

It is the policy of the I-S School District that no person be denied admission to any school in this district or be denied participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be discriminated against in any curricular, extracurricular, pupil series, recreational or other program or activity because of the person's sex, race, religion, national origin, ancestry, creed, pregnancy, marital or parental status, sexual orientation or physical, mental, emotional or learning disability.

This action is required by section 118.13 of the State Statutes.

This policy also prohibits discrimination under related federal law, including Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (race, color, national origin), Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (sex), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (handicap) and Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (disability).

Students who have been identified as having a handicap or disability, under Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act or the Americans with Disabilities Act, shall be provided with reasonable accommodations in educational services or programs.

Students may be considered handicapped or disabled under this policy even if they are not covered under the district's special education policies and procedures.

The district shall also provide for the reasonable accommodation of a student's sincerely held religious beliefs with regard to examinations and other academic requirements.

Requests for accommodations shall be made in writing and approved by the building principal.

Accommodations may include, but not necessarily be limited to, exclusion from participation in an activity, alternative assignments, released time from school to participate in religious activities and opportunities to make up work missed due to religious observances.

Any accommodations granted under this policy shall be provided to students without prejudicial effect.

It shall be the responsibility of the District Administrator to examine existing policies and develop new policies where needed to ensure that the district does not discriminate pursuant to state or federal law.

The district shall ensure that an employee is designated annually to receive complaints under state and federal law. That employee shall assure adoption of a complaint procedure to resolve complaints alleging violation of state or federal law, assure that an evaluation of the district's compliance with state law is completed every five years and submit the necessary forms as required.

Special Education Procedures

The Iola-Scandinavia School District annually publicizes information about its special education procedures and services.

The Iola-Scandinavia School District special education plan is published annually on the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction website.

The Iola-Scandinavia School District identifies, locates and evaluates all children with disabilities, regardless of the severity of their disability, who are in need of special education and related services, including children attending private schools, children who are not yet 3 years of age, mobile children such as migrant and homeless, and children who are suspected of being a child with a disability.

The Iola-Scandinavia School District locates, identifies and evaluates all private school children with disabilities, including religious-school children who are residents of the Iola-Scandinavia School District.

The Iola-Scandinavia School District consults with appropriate representatives of private school children with disabilities on how to locate, identify and evaluate private school children with disabilities.

The Iola-Scandinavia School District ensures the confidentiality of data collected.

The Iola-Scandinavia School District accepts and processes referrals of children suspected to have a disability. The referral must be in writing and include the name of the child and reasons why the person making the referral believes that this child has a disability.

Anyone who has reasonable cause that a child might be a child with a disability can make a referral.

Any parent, physician, nurse, teacher, psychologist, social worker of administrator of a social agency has a legal duty to make a referral.

Before making a referral, the person making the referral must inform the child's parent/guardian of their intent to do so. If the local educational agency to whom the referral is made is the Iola-Scandinavia School District, which the child is attending under the Full-Time Open Enrollment law, the Iola-Scandinavia School District provides the name of the child and related information to the local educational agency of residence.

Whenever the Iola-Scandinavia School District receives a referral for a resident child under the Full-Time Open Enrollment law, the Iola-Scandinavia School District provides the name of the child and the related information to the local educational agency where the child attends school.

School District Records Policies

The following define the Iola-Scandinavia School District's policies for student data and records.

Photographs

Occasionally we photograph students and publish them in the Waupaca County Post, the Orange & Black or post them on the School District web page.

If you do not want your child photographed for publication, please let his/her principal know.

Directory Data

The school may disclose "personally identifiable information," known as directory information, without obtaining parental or adult-student permission, unless the school administrator is requested in writing not to release specified directory information.

"Directory data" means those pupil records which include the pupil's name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, photographs, degrees

and awards received, and the name of the school most recently previously attended by the pupil.

The Iola-Scandinavia School District routinely shares directory data regarding our students, unless a parent/guardian or adult student requests that we do not share such information.

If you do not want such information about your son/daughter released (for example, to military recruiters or colleges) please inform the District Administrator's Office by Sept. 15.

Educational Records

Parents and adult students currently in attendance at the I-S School District have the right of access to educational records that the district keeps on that student.

They have the right to:

- Inspect and review the student's educational records. This request must be made in writing to Caitlin Young, Guidance Counselor.

- Seek amendment of the student's educational records that the parent or adult student believes to be inaccurate,

misleading, or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights. This request must be made in writing to Caitlin Young, Guidance Counselor.

- Consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in this student's educational records except to the extent that federal and state laws authorize disclosure without consent. The district may disclose educational records to administrators, counselors, psychologist or teachers within the district if they have a legitimate educational interest in the records. A legitimate interest is one that has been either assigned or approved by the principal. School officials may inspect records of students assigned to them.

- File a complaint with the Family Policy Compliance Office of the U.S. Department of Education alleging educational agency or institution noncompliance with FERPA requirements. The address of this office is:
